Government proposals to remove safety measures put in place after the Herald of Free Enterprise disaster have been widely condemned.

The regulations were introduced to prevent similar tragedies after the Herald of Free Enterprise capsized on March 6, 1987, resulting in 193 deaths.





- Safety Management Systems are put in place to control, manage and mitigate risk.

Safety Management System (SMS)

Say what you do, do what you say, and prove it


Key Factors for Underwriting and Loss Control Assessment
